

Homework Policy

1. Preamble

Homework is important part of a student's education. The purpose of homework is to:

- encourage students to develop the skills, confidence and motivation to study effectively on their own
- consolidate and reinforce the skills and understanding developed at school
- extend school learning (for example through additional reading)
- develop a work ethic and foster self discipline through the development of independent study habits
- provide opportunities for parents and carers to be involved in their students' learning and be informed about the school work

2. Aim

To develop a consistent approach and clearer understanding regarding the amount and type of work that students are to complete at home

3. Implementation

- 3.1 Teachers have the responsibility of:
 - Setting appropriate homework. This varies depending on the subject
 - Checking homework and encouraging students to record homework in their diary
 - Providing feedback
- 3.2 Parents/carers can assist their children by:
 - Monitoring their child's homework
 - Providing a suitable, quiet work/study environment
 - Encourage their child to review their learning
- 3.3 Students have the responsibility of:
 - Completing set tasks conscientiously and on time
 - Review their learning from each lesson
 - Record all homework in their diary
- 3.4 The amount and type of home work undertaken should take into consideration the following guidelines:

A. Prep to Grade 4

- provide an extension of class work by practising skills or gathering of extra information or materials
- can consist of daily reading to, with, and by parents/carer or older siblings
- does not exceed 30 minutes a day or be set on weekends or during vacations



B. Grade 5 to Year 9

- include daily independent reading
- be coordinated across subjects in secondary schools to avoid unreasonable workloads for students
- extend class work, projects and assignments, essays and research
- does not exceed:
 - o 30 minutes a day at Year 5 to 7
 - o 45 minutes a day in Year 8 and 9

C. Year 10 to 12

- There are three specific types of homework:
 - Specifically set tasks designed to follow a class learning activity or prepare for a learning activity
 - Incidental homework that may involve/ include completion of class work
 - Self study that may involve students reviewing their learning, preparing study material, developing topic summaries. Different ways of study include: reading, mind maps, practice questions, self testing, peer testing, topic summaries
- will generally range from 1–3 hours per week night with up to 6 hours on weekends during peak VCE periods.
